Section 1 – Introduction to your course

This course specification is a formal document, which provides a summary of the main features of your course and the learning outcomes that you might reasonably be expected to achieve and demonstrate if you take full advantage of the learning opportunities that are provided. Further information is contained in the College prospectus, and in various handbooks, all of which you will be able to access online. Your degree course in Music and English is delivered in three stages, each of which comprises one year of full-time study during which you must follow modules to the value of 120 credits). The course provides progressive structures in which you are able to gain ever-wider knowledge and understanding, and appropriate skills. Stages one and two of the course contain mandatory modules that introduce you to fundamentals of each discipline. In stages two and three you can develop your own interests through informed choice among specialist options.

For joint and combined honours courses, please refer to the course specification for your secondary department's corresponding single honours course for further information on educational aims, and learning outcomes.'

While Royal Holloway keeps all the information made available under review, courses and the availability of individual modules, especially optional modules are necessarily subject to change at any time, and you are therefore advised to seek confirmation of any factors which might affect your decision to follow a specific course. In turn, Royal Holloway will inform you as soon as is practicable of any significant changes which might affect your studies.

The following is brief description for some of the most important terminology for understanding the content of this document:

Degree course – May also be referred to as 'degree programme' or simply 'programme', these terms refer to the qualification you will be awarded upon successful completion of your studies.

Module – May also be referred to as 'course', this refers to the individual units you will study each year to complete your degree course. Undergraduate degrees at Royal Holloway comprise a combination of modules in multiples of 15 credits to the value of 120 credits per year. On some degree courses a certain number of optional modules must be passed for a particular degree title.

This table sets out the most important information for the mandatory modules on your degree course. These modules are central to achieving your learning outcomes, so they are compulsory, and all students on your degree course will be required to take them. You will be automatically registered for these modules each year. Mandatory modules fall into two categories; 'condonable' or 'non-condonable'.

In the case of mandatory 'non-condonable' (MNC) modules, you must pass the module before you can proceed to the next year of your course, or to successfully graduate with a particular degree title. In the case of mandatory 'condonable' (MC) modules, these must be taken but you can still progress or graduate even if you do not pass them. Please note that although Royal Holloway will keep changes to a minimum, changes to your degree course may be made where reasonable and necessary due to unexpected events. For example; where requirements of relevant Professional, Statutory or Regulatory Bodies have changed and course requirements must change accordingly, or where changes are deemed necessary on the basis of student feedback and/or the advice of external advisors, to enhance academic provision.

*Contact hours come in various different forms, and may take the form of time spent with a member of staff in a lecture or seminar with other students. Contact hours may also be laboratory or, studio-based sessions, project supervision with a member of staff, or discussion through a virtual learning environment (VLE). These contact hours may be with a lecturer or teaching assistant, but they may also be with a technician, or specialist support staff.

**The way in which each module on your degree course is assessed will also vary, however, the assessments listed above are all 'summative', which means you will receive a mark for it which will count towards your overall mark for the module, and potentially your degree classification, depending on your year of study. On successful completion of the module you will gain the credits listed. 'Coursework' might typically include a written assignment, like an essay. Coursework might also include a report, dissertation or portfolio. 'Practical assessments' might include an oral assessment or presentation, or a demonstration of practical skills required for the particular module.

3.2 Optional modules

In addition to mandatory modules, there will be a number of optional modules available during the course of your degree. The following table lists a selection of optional modules that are likely to be available. However, not all may be available every year. Although Royal Holloway will keep changes to a minimum, new options may be offered or existing ones may be withdrawn. For example; where reasonable and necessary due to unexpected events, where requirements of relevant Professional, Statutory or Regulatory Bodies (PSRBs) have changed and course requirements must change accordingly, or where changes are deemed necessary on the basis of student feedback and/or the advice of External Advisors, to enhance academic provision. There may be additional requirements around option selection, so it is important that this specification is read alongside your department's Student Handbook, which you can access via the Music [webpage](#), English [webpage](#).

3.3 Optional module requirements

Stage One:
 The curriculum in **Music** is as follows:
 Students on Required Intensive Theory entry must take the **mandatory condonable MU1111 Fundamentals of Music Theory**, then choose 30 credits of additional modules, including no more than 15 credits from List D; while all other students choose 45 credits of additional modules, including at least 15 credits from Lists B or C; and no more than 15 credits from List D.

In **English**, you choose second year modules to the value of 60 credits, and may also choose one module from the following list:

EN1106 Shakespeare (30 credits)

EN1001 Medieval Literature (30 credits)

You are advised that over the module of your second and third years in English, you must take at least 15 credits of pre-1780 literature, excluding all Shakespeare options, but including all Medieval Literature modules.

Stage Three:

You choose **Music** modules to the value of 60 credits drawn from level 6 modules.

You choose English modules to the value of 60 credits drawn from the range of Stage 3 options available.

Note:

(i) The curriculum above reflects the equal division of the 360 credits of a Joint Honours course into 180 credits of each component. Over stages two and three the Music curriculum may be decreased or increased by up to 30 credits to give the permitted minimum of 150 and maximum of 210 credits in Music.

(ii) Within stages two and three, and subject to the approval of the Departments concerned, up to 30 'elective' credits of level 5 or level 6 modules in other Departments may be substituted for Music modules.

(iii) Prerequisites may apply to optional modules.

Section 4 - Progressing through each year of your degree course

All first year students on single, joint or combined honours courses offered all or in part by the School of Humanities, School of Performing and Digital Arts, or department of Politics, International Relations and Philosophy are required to pass a Moodle-based writing skills quiz in order to progress into the second year of study. The pass mark for the test is 60%. Certificates of Distinction are awarded to students who achieve at least 80% in the quiz. Students may attempt the quiz as often as they wish with no penalties or capping. Students who meet the requirements for progression as stipulated in the [College's Undergraduate Regulations](#) (Section: Conditions for progression to the next stage) but fail to pass the Moodle-based quiz will not be permitted to progress into their second year of academic study at the College.

Section 5 – Educational aims of the course

The aims of this course are:

- to engage you imaginatively in the process of reading and analysing literary texts, while enabling you to develop independent critical thinking and judgement;
- to encourage a deeper understanding of music through the detailed study of its manifold aspects, while at the same time promoting the development of your intellectual, critical, practical and creative abilities;
- to promote the study of music and literature in their historical and social contexts;
- to produce graduates equipped with the knowledge and skills necessary for the undertaking of further study of music and/or literature at postgraduate level, if desired, and with personal attributes and professional skills relevant to the wider world beyond the academic study of music and literature.

Section 6 - Course learning outcomes

In general terms, the courses provide opportunities for students to develop and demonstrate the following learning outcomes. (*Categories – Knowledge and understanding (K), Skills and other attributes (S), and Transferable skills (*)*)

The range of cultural, social, political and historical contexts in which music and literature are created and used, and how music and literature are shaped by cultural change (K); 4. a range of contemporary critical and theoretical approaches to English literature and to music (K); 5. some of the ways in which music and literature relate to each other and to other disciplines (K); 6. critical skills in the analysis and critical interpretation of literary texts and musical scores (S); 7. skills in manipulating both words and musical notation in the service of creative or interpretive tasks (S); 8. the ability to conduct literary and musicological research independently using traditional and electronic resources, and develop habits of reflection on study, reading, learning and research (S*); 9. command of a wider vocabulary and appropriate critical and theoretical terminology (S); 10. planning and execution of essays and project-work, bibliographical skills, developing a reasoned argument (S*); | <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 11. advanced written and oral communication skills, including the ability to present logical and coherent written and oral arguments of varying lengths (S*); 12. the ability to organise and interpret complex information in a structured and systematic way, and to comprehend and develop sophisticated concepts (S*); 13. the capacity for independent thought and judgement, along with skills in critical reasoning (S*); 14. information technology skills (including word processing, email, WWW, information handling and retrieval), and the ability to engage with the textual use of new media, video, TV, DVD and electronic (S*); 15. interpersonal skills, involving recognising, respecting and responding to the viewpoints of others (S*); 16. time management and organisational skills including working to deadlines, prioritising tasks, organising work-time (S*); 17. in addition, this course fosters the development of a range of personal attributes that are important in the world of work, and that strengthen the graduates' abilities to engage in lifelong learning and contribute to the wider community. These include personal motivation; the ability to work autonomously and with others; self-awareness and self-management; empathy and insight; intellectual integrity; awareness of responsibility as a local, national and international citizen; interest in lifelong learning; flexibility and adaptability; creativity (S). |

Teaching and learning is mostly by means of lectures, seminars, essay consultations, oral presentations and guided independent study. Assessment of knowledge and understanding is typically by formal examinations, coursework, examined essays, oral presentations, recitals, portfolios of compositions, and the dissertation or long essay. In addition, students may be involved in workshops and may produce various forms of creative work.
