An Introduction to the Project...



- 20 years of HMIP prison inspections and surveys
- Historic survey data from almost 100,000 respondents
- More than **10 million** analysable responses
- Collected from every **prison** in England and Wales







The Project Objectives...



The Project seeks to develop a 20 year database of detainee surveys to:

- Identify prisoners' self-reported characteristics and experiences of imprisonment with regard to key elements of their treatment and conditions
- Understand how these perceptions differ according to prisoners'
 characteristics and circumstances, sentence type, and changes in the external environment
- Use this knowledge to inform the work of practitioners and policy makers
- Prepare aspects of the database for use by other academic researchers,
 teachers and policy makers

Building the Foundations...



The Feasibility Study

- Initial exploration of prisoner survey responses over the last 20 years
- Conducted February to June 2020
- In partnership between RHUL and HMIP

Set out to:

- Establish the extent of the survey data held,
- the ethical and practical problems involved in accessing and using it (focus groups with currently serving prisoners), and
- included undertaking the initial pilot study.



Methods...



Three distinct but overlapping streams to the work

Data cleansing and sorting

Processing survey versions,
aggregating data, and organising datasets into subsets of survey versions and thematic areas

Addressing the research questions

Iterative process of using the literature, data analysis and stakeholder feedback to identify answers to research questions

Legacy work

Generating a database for use by other academic researchers, teachers and policy makers and depositing it with the UK Data Service.



- Surveyed institutions:
 - Prisons, Young Offender Institutions, Secure Training Centres, Immigration Removal Centres, and Military Detention Centres
- Survey is handed out to a representative sample of the prison population;
 sample size is calculated to ensure that findings reflect the experience of
 the entire establishment population
- Overall response rate between 75% and 85%



 Questions follow the detainee's journey and seek to ascertain the detainee's perspective on how they are treated


Data allow for

- Comparing detainees' experiences in the inspected establishment to the experiences of detainees in similar establishments,
- Comparing current experiences of detainees in the inspected establishment to those reported in previous inspections in the same establishments, and
- Conducting sub-group analyses to compare characteristics and experiences of different populations (age, gender, ethnicity, functional type, etc.)



Example: Feeling safe by prison functional type over time.




Example: Prisoners who report that they visit the **library** frequently are those who also report that their experiences in prison made them less likely to **offend** in the future.

Example: Prison design and staff-prisoner relationships.






Example: Women and Mental Health (2021-22)

60% of women did not report any mental health problems when they first arrived.


OF THOSE: DO YOU [NOW] HAVE ANY MENTAL HEALTH PROBLEMS?

The Database...



- Data analysed within the project is deposited to the UK Data Service upon completion of the project (JUNE 2023).
- Detainee survey data is classified as 'safeguarded data'; this requires
 - users to be registered with the UK Data Service,
 - for depositors to grant permission, and
 - for data to be accessed for non-commercial purposes.
- The data is accompanied with documents that provide clear instructions on how to navigate the historical HMIP survey data.
- At present, data is available to users from the European Economic Area
 (EEA; EU member states + Iceland, Liechtenstein, and Norway); please
 do get in touch, though, if you are interested and from a non-EEA country.
