Offering more than 40 courses from across a thousand years of English, American and global literature, English at Royal Holloway is a particularly wide-ranging subject which allows you to follow your individual passions. The Department of English is a close, inclusive community, which prides itself on:

 course to help you make the transition to university. In addition to the
 state-of-the-art study facilities on campus, you can access central
 London resources, and develop your literary passions through a variety

- Award-winning teaching staff. We write ground-breaking books, feature in the national media, advise national and international bodies, and have won numerous national prizes for teaching. You will have the opportunity to be taught by our senior scholars, who are both outstanding researchers and committed teachers.
- Inspirational creative writing community. With an unprecedented seven Fellows of the Royal Society of Literature, two winners of the James Tait Black Prize for Fiction, prize winning poets, and a BBC National Short Story judge for 2018 on our teaching staff, you will be taught by some of the best writers in the UK today. When you graduate, you will join the ranks of notable alumni, including the winner of the International Dylan Thomas Prize 2018, Kayo Chingonyi, and author of the British Book Awards Book of the Year 2017, Sarah Perry.

Choosing your degree

Both our single and joint honours degrees offer you diverse and engaging opportunities to study literature across time and continents. Our first year gives you a grounding in new and familiar literature and ways of thinking. In subsequent years, you can follow your own interests to delve deeper and wider into the literary world. After your first year, you can also take courses in other departments, and even opt to study abroad for a year.

We pride ourselves on our designated 'transition programme' to help you make the move to university study, and a 'step up' programme to help meet the challenges of each new year. Teaching methods vary between seminars, lectures, small group teaching, individual supervision, online resources, and study and reading groups. Creative Writing is typically taught through workshops. Students can see their tutor for one-to-one feedback on written work, and all courses feature specific academic support weeks.

A dedicated writing tutor offers students personal sessions to improve essay writing skills. Library and IT training are available throughout the degree: we have a designated library professional for English students, who provides specialised support to enable you to make the most of our impressive library and learning resources.

Coursework essays are our main assessment mode, but we also offer assessed presentations, online projects and some traditional exams. Exam-free pathways are possible after the first year. We are unusual in still setting 'formative' or practice essays, and in offering individual feedback on all work to help you to achieve your best marks on assessed work.

Simply put, we will provide you with exceptional teaching and individualised support on degree programmes that offer you a wealth of flexibility and choice.

Studying here

Our learning community encourages you to develop your confidence, independence and creativity as a writer and thinker. You will be part of an outstanding learning environment, which features:

Readings and festivals

Regular readings on campus by celebrated authors and poets give you a chance to understand your pathways to success. Lecturers also run special interest reading groups on experimental novelists, American writers, Sci-Fi, Shakespeare, Tolkien, Old English, and more. For performers, we co-host the PLAY! Festival to showcase student work, and the Runnymede Literary Festival with Runnymede Borough Council.

Internationally-recognised Creative Writing programme

Even if you are not taking a BA including Creative Writing, you can choose a specially-designed course in years two and three of your degree.

Studying abroad

You can choose to study for an extra integral year at one of our partner universities in Australia, Canada, China, Japan, Korea, Mexico, New Zealand or the USA. Students reading English & Modern Languages will spend their third year in a country appropriate to their chosen foreign language, and return to Royal Holloway for their fourth year.

Courses in other departments

In years two and three of your degree, we encourage you to take a course in history, drama, politics, or media arts, where it will support your literary studies. You will also have the flexibility to choose courses from unrelated departments, like Management, where availability allows.

Research centres

The department is home to two internationally-renowned research centres: the Centre for Victorian Studies, and the Poetics Research Centre. While our postgraduate students are heavily invested in these centres, as an undergraduate you will also have access to their events and networks.

Our leafy parkland campus is only 10 minutes from London Heathrow Airport and 45 minutes by train to London Waterloo, giving you access to all the benefits of London's cultural and literary life, including the South Bank, Shakespeare's Globe, and the theatres of the West End. As a student of the University of London, you are also entitled to use the excellent University of London Library at Senate House.

Your future career

- conveying arguments, opinions, and independent and creative thought
- critical reasoning and analysis
- distilling information to pick out essential points, while conveying meaning precisely
- commanding a broad range of vocabulary, persuasive communication, and critical terminology
- planning, independent research and work, and time management.

Extra-curricular activities

We take your employability seriously. Whilst preserving the academic integrity of your degree, we have dedicated staff in the department who work with our alumni team, Careers & Employability Service, and Community Action team on a range of networking events and practical training opportunities, to support you to build a compelling CV alongside your studies.

Royal Holloway runs an award-winning work placement scheme for students in their second year. Department of English students have been placed with companies including: The Telegraph, the Press Association, literary agencies, publishers, and PR, TV, film, theatre, marketing and technology companies.

Our graduates find jobs in fields ranging from publishing, literary agency, and freelance writing, to cultural heritage, arts management, and theatre, and from finance, civil service, technology, and law, to media, PR, marketing, and management.

Some also go on to teaching or further degrees in literature and other fields.
