"Fifty years, almost to the day, from when we first met for Freshers' Week at Bedford College, 26 of us converged on the Rose Garden for a celebration picnic. There was a core of geographers, but also people who studied geology, physics and modern languages. Some had seen each other in the intervening years, others not at all. "In a previous issue of the Bedford Society newsletter, we reported the death of Brian Sheldon, former Professor of Social Work at Bedford College and then at Royal Holloway and Bedford New College. His appointment in 1984, initially to a senior lectureship and then to a personal chair, at Bedford marked big changes that had been unfolding in the status of



social work training as a research-based academic discipline – a discipline that is strongly maintained at RHBNC by the current social work team based in the Faculty of Law and Social Sciences. In particular, the establishment and early development of the very successful MSc in Social Work owes a great deal to Brian Sheldon's leadership." **Read more**.

Seeing War Through Gender Lenses Speaker: Dr Laura Sjoberg, British Academy Global Professor of Politics and International Relations at Royal Holloway and Bedford New College and Director of the Gender Institute

Gender is everywhere in our images of wars and conflicts

– from soldiers to civilian casualties. Off-hand statements about what men do in wars and what women do in wars frequently appear in media, in official statements, and even our personal discourses about war and conflict. Yet looking at war and searching for gender finds much more complexity – questions of agency, violence, and even the nature of conflict itself. In this talk, Laura Sjoberg (pictured) argues that the relationship between gender and war is fundamental – that one cannot think of one without the other – and

multi-faceted, and provides an introduction to questions asked about conflict through gender lenses.

There will be time for questions and discussion, as well as the opportunity to meet fellow Bedfordians over light refreshments.

2023 Fawcett Lecture by Dr Sabrina Cohen-Hatton

Thursday 23 February, 6.15pm in the Beatrice Shilling Building, Egham campus

Dr Sabrina Cohen-Hatton is one of the most senior woman fire officers in the world. In the College's 2023 Fawcett Lecture, Sabrina will speak to Professor Polly Dalton from the Department of Psychology about why certain qualities associated with success are viewed less favourably for women. She explores the everyday prejudices women experience through the prism of success. From leadership, to risk-taking, perception and failure, Sabrina exposes the invisible barriers that are holding women back. **Read more and book tickets**.

The Fawcett Lecture is named after Dame Millicent Fawcett GBE, English suffragist, political and union leader and writer. It was endowed in 1929 by Theresa Gosse, an alumna of Bedford College. According to the terms of the endowment, the subject matter should deal with 'the change in the position of women'.



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
